Staff time to transport materials to site and assist with tree planting events. Labour to install mulch mats following planting. MATERIALS 1,300 whips, tree planting spades, stakes, shelters and mulch mats (all provided by Trees for Climate funding). PERMISSION Tadpole Field was already owned by Haydon Wick Parish Council, so landowner permission was secured from the outset. Permission had to be sought from the County Archaeologist, the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust and the Forestry Commission was also sought from the Environment Agency, due to the proposed planting being within 7m of a main river, the River Ray. The Great Western Community Forest Team assisted in obtaining these consents. CONTRACTORS Labour was provided by the Parish's grounds maintenance team and volunteers (61 volunteers attended the tree planting events). Steps to 1. Identify a suitable location for your woodland 2. Obtain landowner permission 3. Ensure all necessary checks are carried out 4. Engage stakeholders from the outset 5. Good communication and partnership working throughout the project 6. Encourage community investment and involvement with the woodland
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FCONOMIC Trees for Climate funding will cover maintenance of the woodland for 15
BASIS years. Parish Council has responsibility for maintaining grass paths on the
site.
COMMUNITY The creation of a community woodland has a positive impact on mental
BENEFIT and physical health. Woodlands provide a venue for social activity and
educational resources.
ENVIRONMENTAL The carbon sequestration calculation is not exact, but we can estimate that
IMPACT an average of approximately 429 tonnes of CO2 are stored in one hectare
of land (formula taken from Forest Research). Tadpole Field will eventually
sequester around 300 tonnes of carbon and increase canopy cover within
the Parish by a significant amount. The community woodland is a
significant opportunity to provide lasting benefits for wildlife and improved
biodiversity.
MAINTENANCE Following the period of establishment, maintenance of the woodland will
be minimal. Creation of a community woodland group would be
encouraged by the Parish Council working in conjunction with the local
wildlife trust.
